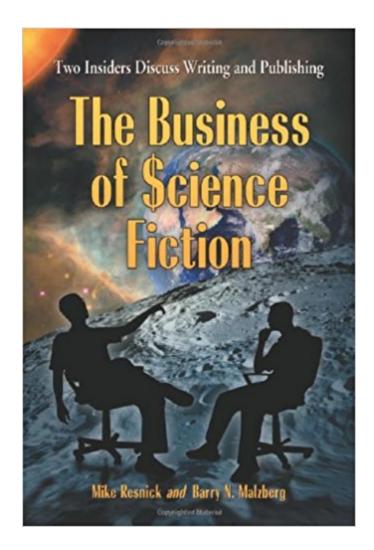


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The Business Of Science Fiction: Two Insiders Discuss Writing And Publishing

Mike Resnick, named Locus magazine's all-time leading award winner for short science fiction, is the author of 58 novels, 225 short stories, and 2 screenplays, and is the editor of 48 anthologies. He lives in Cincinnati, Ohio. Barry N. Malzberg is the author of more than 90 books and has edited science fiction anthologies and magazines. He won the first John Campbell Memorial Award, has won two Locus Awards for essay collections, and is a Hugo and Nebula Award nominee.

A bit dated, as many people just bypass the old-fashioned way of publishing (through established publishing houses). They do address that a bit at the end, but this is more relevant as historical memoir than guideline to current writers. Old white men dominated science fiction for years, just like

they did everything else, but things are changing now (thank goodness!)

I have been trying to write science fiction for some months now, and this book is about the business of doing just that. The two authors are established science fiction professionals with many dozens of books and short stories to their credit. They are exactly the people who can tell what needs to be done to "get published". After reading their tome, however - and it is as expected very well written - I am absolutely convinced I do not want to work through a traditional publisher as these gentlemen have done. The bureaucracy! The begging and cajoling and figuring and strategizing needed to just get an audience with one of these organizations! Positively daunting. I was on the fence about indie publishing - no more. It's indie for me.

This book is exactly what it purports to be and that is perfectly fine: a series of meaty discussions from two long-published and very experienced sci-fi authors on all parts of the publishing industry as relates to the past and the currents trends in Sci-Fi publishing and selling, including the awards and the magazines. For a lover of writing and a huge fan of sci-fi from the 50's to now, I was pleased to read as these guys covered all the bases. I thoroughly enjoyed this book and am glad to own and keep it to refer back to.

As a fairly new science fiction writer with a handful of pro-credits, I've read a number of books on writing. There are "how-to" books and books on the writer's life, but none have been as helpful, as important, and as candid as Mike Resnick and Barry Malzberg's The Business of Science Fiction: Two Insiders Discuss Writing and Publishing. Reading the "dialogues" in this book (which originally appeared in the SFWA Bulletin, the organ of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America) is like sitting between two seasoned veterans and listening them give you the kind of candid advice that no one else will give you about the business of science fiction writing. It is an absolute pleasure to read, and moreover, it gives potential authors the low-down on what to expect (not large advances and cocktail parties, for one thing). At times, the advice and insider stories of the publishing business can seem downright depressing, but if you take what Mike and Barry say, and balance it with your own experience in the genre, then what you find is that they are providing you with invaluable information to use when making important career decision. This book contains the kind of information every would-be science fiction writer needs to hear, but few in the industry are willing to share or admit. It is a remarkable collection of discussions ranging from topics like agents and money to e-books and the Google settlement. It's a must-have for anyone serious about

becoming a science fiction writer and I highly recommend it.

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
