


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Heretics And Heroes: How Renaissance Artists And Reformation Priests Created Our World

I've read all of Cahill's history books and this one continues where "Mysteries of the Middle Ages" left off. I find his writing to make for an interesting read while discussing sometimes complicated material. So if you're into history, philosophy or theology, I highly recommend this book.

This book is an absolute joy to read and to absorb. It is particularly informative for those who are not

religious but who are well versed in classical studies and philosophy. More than anything it helps understand the Christian religion, its struggles, catastrophes and success in guiding human development through the past 2000 plus years. It is also a clear pictorial and philosophical condemnation of ignorance and stupidity among those who base their lives on religion without understanding of theology and its history. I am going to read it again after I think about it for few months for one reading is not enough to absorb its vast amount of historical data and ideas, which has challenged humanity for so long and continues to challenge us. And I greatly enjoyed its references to contemporaries and modern events.

I love all of Cahill's books and highly recommend them! Cahill focuses on those moments he calls "the hinges of history." They are those moments when someone thought something new - in art, music, philosophy, or architecture - and things were never the same. I also enjoy how he sheds light on the contributions of women, albeit those who could contribute because they were given to the church or learned to read and write, and how those women left a lasting influence on art and music. Cahill's writing style is very accessible and makes you feel like you're learning something new from a familiar friend. This series is great!

Another excellent book by Thomas Cahill. It traces how religion influences art, particularly during the Middle Ages, and also how that art reflected society during the period. However, as usual Thomas Cahill allows his bias towards one sect of Catholicism over another get in the way. This is why I decline to give it 5 stars for this otherwise excellent study.
