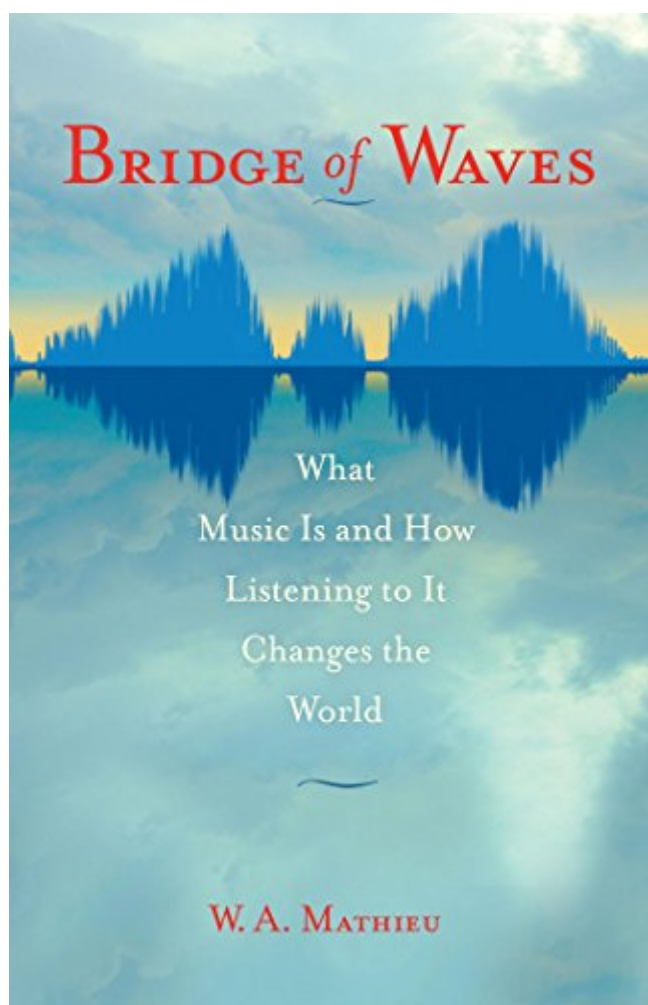

This book contains a few hundred pages of mostly unstructured free association. It is clear that Mathieu has a deep emotional connection to music and an interesting perspective. However, he lacks knowledge of history, human biology, acoustics, and signal processing. As such, this book provides very little factual insight and very much anecdotal poetry. If you approach this book as a source of entertainment and a description of what music means to a prolific musician and composer,

you may be satisfied. Unfortunately, if you seek knowledge or insight into what music is, or how music affects human minds and culture, you will be disappointed.

I answered a quiet ad which invited me, with others in similar distress (I felt), to gather and sit in a circle with him. He invited us all to talk and his openness, his presence loosened us all and we spoke of what had brought us to this gathering. He LISTENED, this in caps because it was a rare demonstration of a listening that drew on all the resources of body, mind, heart and soul to simply receive, without judgment, all we offered. We had a simple, delicious vegetarian lunch, then gathered in circle again, where he spoke to each in turn. The man glowed softly, not the tinsel twinkling of ME but the rainbow rays of one awakened by Love. Having truly heard each of us he spoke simply, personally, of what he heard, felt. For me it was summarized as, "You're fine as you are now; go on with your story...." I didn't then hear that gathering as music, but now do. The next summer I went to Sufi music camp, there to dance and sing, study and absorb and meet Hamza El Din, another lover-musician whose heartbeat, pristine and pure, is luminously evident through his music-making. Well then! Do visit W.A. Mathieu at Cold Mountain Music, [...]but wait! First click on [...], where, with heart-ears wide open you may hear, see and feel the joy-work of an extraordinary ordinary man who fell in Love with musicking and-----well, I imagine Allaudin being asked, "Why DO you do all this composing, playing, teaching and writing about music?" and he replying, "I can't help it."

W.A. Mathieu has written a suite of poetic, lyrical, and philosophical books about music, as well an extraordinary (and very important) book about harmony (Harmonic Experience). Bridge of Waves is a beautiful series of essays, ostensibly about music, but really a series of pithy, lovely, and pertinent

meditations about improvisation, cognitive development, aging, and just plain being in the world and living a good life. His writing is filled with spirit, wisdom, and common sense. If you are a musician, and you are willing to explore the relationship between listening and awareness, there is no better guide. If you are a music listener, this will help you listen with more depth and attention. And if you are a wisdom seeker, then *Bridge of Waves* will help you connect mindfulness to sound and vibration. I work in the fields of environment, sustainability, and organizational leadership. I am also an amateur musician. *Bridge of Waves* helps me make connections between all aspects of my life. It will do the same for you.
