This book is extensive - bringing to the forefront extensively researched data about New Englands' early settlers burials, those who mastered the gravestone carvings, and the designs and lettering which were unique to specific geographic NE areas.

This book was purchased for the genealogical section of our local library to assist people interested in their genealogy to understand their heritage or to be used as a guide for those artists who are interested in early stonework.

Planning a trip to an old cemetery in New England and wanted to have a better understanding of those grave marker symbols. Now I do. Very informative.

Fascinating, thorough consideration of the historical art sprinkled over the Northeast.

Particularly striking are the many plates which provide a rare insight into the artistic notions of a culture that generally frowned on decoration. As a document on early American notions of form, the books holds its own with the best studies of architecture, pottery and antiques that I have seen.

I'm a longtime history and burial ground enthusiast, but only recently made my first trip to New England (Boston) and was able to see two historic burial grounds on the Freedom Trail (King's Chapel and Old Granary) - loved them - until then, I had seen some beautiful headstones from as early as the mid-19th century in places like Missouri, Texas, and Kansas, but had never before seen the Puritan-inspired carvings from the late 1600s through the 1700s. This book made for great follow up reading - as an adapted PhD dissertation, it can be a bit heavy at times, esp. in the beginning in introducing the intersection of religious history, art history, and historical methodology, but it really hits its stride in Part II and the first part of Chapter III...the number of individual illustrations is between 250-300 and are absolutely amazing. Some important points I picked up on were the mistaken notion that the Puritans had no religious art; the matching of Puritan and Biblical references to the iconography on the stones; the use of period (1600s/1700s) "emblem books" or primers as models for the iconography - the famous Joseph Tapping stone I saw in Boston came to life when compared with the page from Quarles' "Hieroglyphiques of the Life of Man." A good bibliographic essay at the end provides some useful reading, but by 2015, it is dated (I read the 1999 reprint) - HIGHLY RECOMMENDED

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
