


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Research Strategies: Finding Your Way Through The Information Fog, 5th Edition

William Badke is associate librarian for Associated Canadian Theological Schools and Information Literacy at Trinity Western University, British Columbia Canada. Since the mid-1980s, he has been teaching students the joy of research done well. His book, Research Strategies, now in its fifth edition, is a leading resource for courses in informational research.

It seems that he is writing to perhaps a grad or post grad level. The problem is that the tips, tools, and hints that he gives are all that someone should have well before that level. Dont expect to learn much new but do expect it to be a library research refresher.

Excellent book that explains how to do academic research, prepare for writing a paper (if you have read enough that you can explain your topic for 1-minute to someone else, then you are ready to write your paper!), and all of the new databases that are available to use to find vetted articles.
