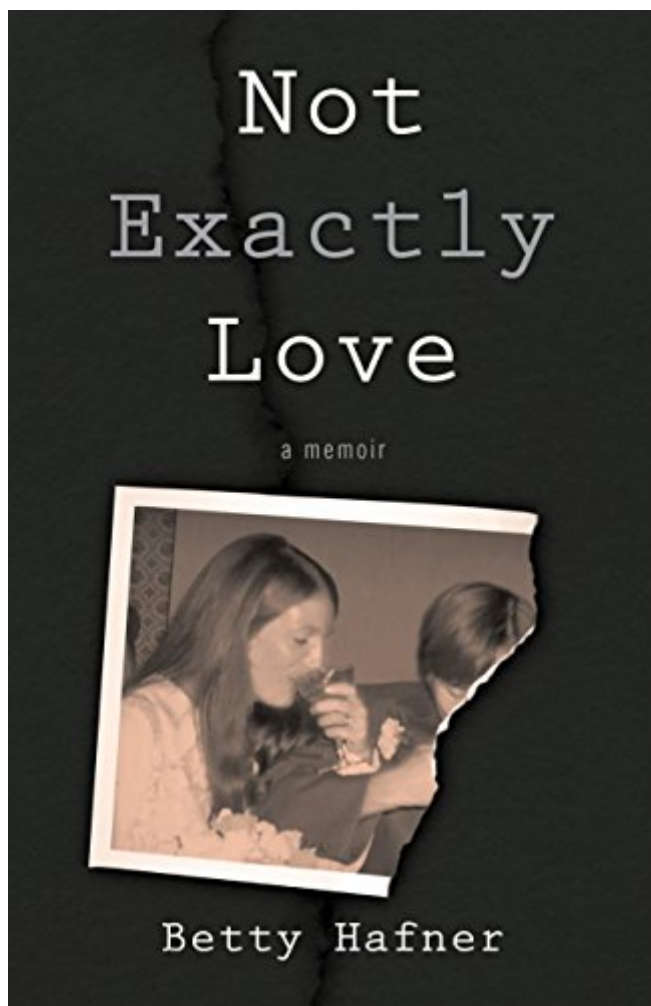


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# Not Exactly Love: A Memoir



## Synopsis

My ex husband recently passed away. I was surprised how much it affected me. I thought I would only feel joy at the news. There was no joy. I may felt sad that I lost so much of myself in that marriage, as Betty did. For years I threw myself into my next marriage, and protecting my daughter

from her father. It was cathartic reading Betty's story, knowing I wasn't the only outwardly strong woman trapped for years in what wasn't exactly love.

This outstanding book shows the complexity of a violent marriage from the inside. It's worth reading by anyone who works with women in abusive relationships, any woman who wonders why she's putting up with being hurt, or any woman who still feels guilty that she left. The book is especially valuable because it shows the internal world of a well educated, middle class woman who does not fit the stereotype of the domestic violence "victim." Hafner masterfully depicts the slow descent and the dismantling of confidence that makes the ongoing and ever-increasing abuse possible. This book should be on the shelf of every shelter.

I enjoyed reading this poignant and courageous memoir of a bright, sensitive young woman who literally stumbled down the stairs into a bad marriage. Betty delicately juxtaposes her feelings of sadness, disappointment, and despair with a persistent expression of hope and emerging self-confidence. In that sense hers is a story about the challenge of maintaining one's dignity and self-worth in the face of unrelenting negativity and violence. Although Betty's story ends well, it is apparent just how easily it could have ended tragically, as have similar tales of other women. I particularly like the way Betty captured the flavor of life in the late 1960's and early 1970's, which brought back many memories. Although those were different times in many ways, one thing has not changed: some men still treat women horribly. Read the book to learn how that feels and how to survive.

From the beginning, *Not Exactly Love* is the page turner well-seasoned novelists aspire to. And yet, the stakes are so much greater. Betty Hafner shares decades old memories that many struggle with today, and does so honestly, intimately, with dignity and encouragement. If their connection wasn't exactly love, Hafner manages to give weight to the positive as well as the negative interactions of an abusive relationship, and does so with intelligence, courage and, yes, love. This is a should read for every woman suffering spousal abuse, and every single looking for Mr. Right.

Truth is always better than fiction - and so is this memoir about the complexity of being in a relationship that is simultaneously fun and enjoyable - and devastatingly abusive and frightening. Without psychoanalyzing every situation and resorting to easy "pop culture" statements - Betty describes the feelings, confusion, disbelief that comes when a relationship isn't what you thought it would be. She has the courage to lay bare her own foibles so that there is no feeling of heavy-handedness. The benefit of therapy is evident as she examines her own upbringing as well as her husband's and how that plays into how both act out their lives, and to how she can construct a more promising future for herself. And at the end she also reinforces the need we all have for supportive and caring friends to help us through the toughest of times. All young women should read this!

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
