

The book offers a good introduction to the principles and basics of palliative care, detailing the physiological and psychological antecedents to which each type of intervention is tied. Drug therapy is covered in detail, as well as the active dying process and a number of the most common conditions that might cause a patient to wind up in hospice. I thought the coverage of pediatric patients was a bit skimpy, but perhaps the authors expected you to rely more upon developmental communication skills and treatment strategies learned elsewhere. If you're already an RN, it shouldn't be too dense of a read, although you'll probably need to review some sections multiple times to commit everything to memory. I might even recommend it to a layperson caregiver or relative of a patient with a terminal illness who wants to better understand the process and reasons

for the treatments and behaviour of healthcare personnel. It also works well as the main reading selection for an introductory palliative care curriculum.
