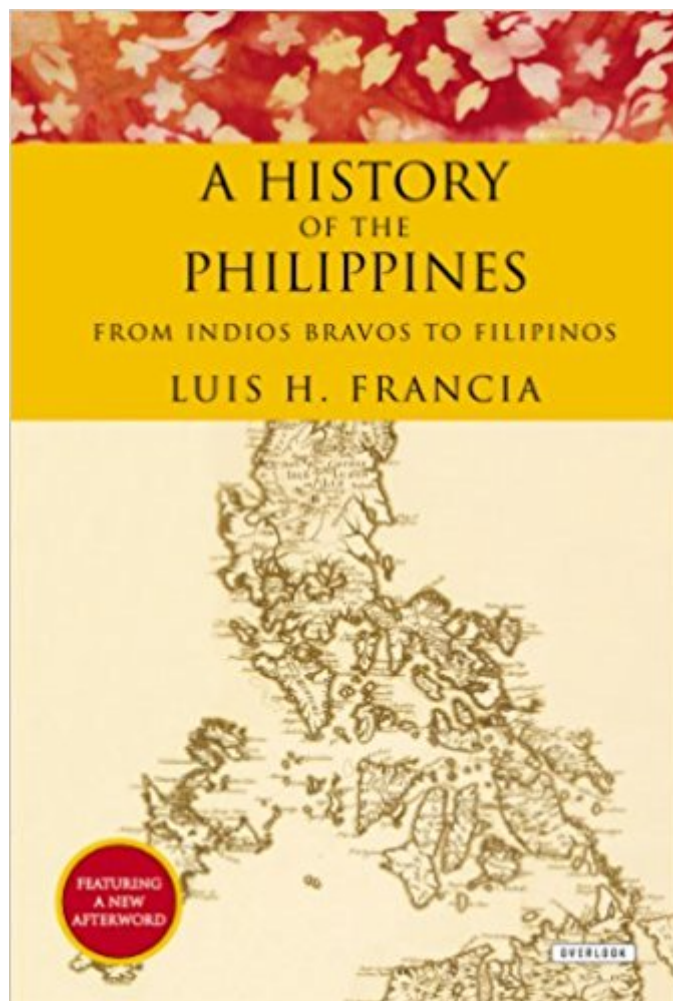

Luis H. Francia was born in the Philippines and moved to New York in the 1970s. He teaches at the City University of Hong Kong, Hunter College, and New York University.

I love history, and was keen to devour whatever information I could find about the Philippines. This book certainly whet my appetite for further, more in-depth histories. Right from the outset, the author indicates that this was never intended to be an all-encompassing history. He also acknowledged

that he wasn't an historian. What I found most valuable was the vital understanding of the Philippines' history in terms of its colonial past, and which remains the common thread throughout the majority of the book. There was also the recurring theme of corruption, which continues to this day. Those insights aside, my favorite part of the book was the chapter devoted to pre-colonial times. I wish there had been more on this topic, but there are probably other books which expound on the subject. In terms of scholarship, there was an extensive list of references which I will probably mine for future reading endeavors. There is also a glossary of Filipino and Spanish terms which are used throughout the book, and which proved highly enlightening and informative. While I wouldn't consider this the best history book out there, it is an engaging read that provides a quick (if biased) overview of Filipino history and some interesting cultural analysis.
