


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The Cambridge Companion To Duke Ellington (Cambridge Companions To Music)

Duke Ellington is widely held to be the greatest jazz composer and one of the most significant cultural icons of the twentieth century. This comprehensive and accessible Companion is the first collection of essays to survey, in depth, Ellington's career, music, and place in popular culture. An international cast of authors includes renowned scholars, critics, composers, and jazz musicians. Organized in three parts, the Companion first sets Ellington's life and work in context, providing new information about his formative years, method of composing, interactions with other musicians, and activities abroad; its second part gives a complete artistic biography of Ellington; and the final section is a series of specific musical studies, including chapters on Ellington and song-writing, the jazz piano, descriptive music, and the blues. Featuring a chronology of the composer's life and major recordings, this book is essential reading for anyone with an interest in Ellington's enduring artistic legacy.

The scholarship and passion in this book simply took my breath away, as did its presentation of musical technique and how it arises from, and conveys deep emotion. It immeasurably enriches the understanding of music and a great American composer. I heartily recommend this book from which I have derived great delight as a reader and lover of music. Through reading it, I have come to know Ellington's music more truly, and to love it more than ever. I'm particularly affected by Walter van de Leur's contribution entitled, "'Seldom seen, but always heard': Billy Strayhorn," from which I learned a great deal about Ellington and Strayhorn's important collaborations and mutual respect for each other. It also makes clear Ellington's happiness about the fact that Strayhorn's approach and style were so different from his own. Ellington, the author writes, "would not have been interested in a mere imitator." Also, I was thrilled and deeply educated by editor Edward Green's wonderful introduction. With true scholarship and unmistakable joy, he inquires thoughtfully and convincingly into the questions: What makes Duke Ellington's best music so great, and what can we learn from it as human beings? I'm very glad I met this book. You will be too.

I have loved Duke Ellington's music for a long time, and felt along with millions of others, that he

was the greatest jazz composer. But I knew very little about his influence on and from other musicians. So glad for this book! While being at once scholarly and educational, it is also entertaining and moving, to find out more about the large, kind person Duke Ellington was. I liked the chapter "Conductor of Music and Men," by Stephen D. James and J. Walker James, which among other things, describes Ellington's close collaboration and friendship with the great Billy Strayhorn. And then the chapter by Walter van de Leur writes further and more comprehensively about this important alliance. Much more to say--but if you love Duke Ellington, you'll love him more after you read The Cambridge Companion to Duke Ellington.

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
