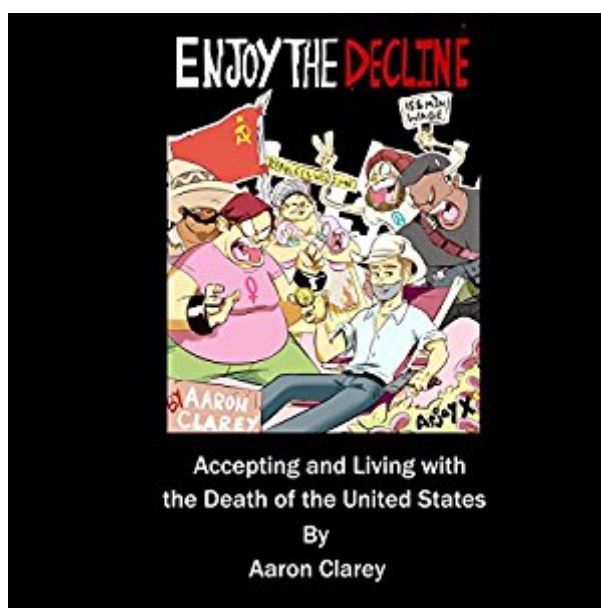


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# Enjoy The Decline: Accepting And Living With The Death Of The United States

This is a bracing dose of reality that will force you to decide if Clarey exaggerates or if he is brave enough to speak the truth. I think that he correct in 85% of what he writes. He'll make you think. He may change your life. What he won't do is shovel more bulls\*\*\* at you. He speaks what he believes is the truth and it is refreshing.

Aaron Clarey says what no one wants to hear but everyone needs to: the government is not your friend and is, in fact, an enemy of America and civilization in general. But Clarey (Captain Capitalism) goes farther. He gently, humorously convinces the intelligent, civilized reader that things are far worse than he thought. And he puts to rest any guilt or responsibility on the part of supporters of capitalism and freedom for this parlous state of affairs. It may not really be possible to "enjoy the decline" but it's certainly easy to enjoy this book. Highly recommended.

Remember when you do get a job, your helping in supporting a segment of society that is needy. I personally know a couple of people who laugh at me working my job while they are collecting welfare and joking that I am paying for it. So his advice on doing all you can to avoid a dead-end job that you hate and pays low is wise indeed. And this is true also, no one takes you seriously in the business world unless you are 30-35, that was definitely true in my case. I know a lot of people over 40 who read the book will disagree with some of the author's viewpoints, (possible denial to reality of what is going on at this moment in this country) however if I was under the age of 35, I would pay attention very seriously because there is so much good realistic advice in this book. Even though the United States is in decline (people having no shame, uninformed voters, more prejudice than ever, lower moral standards, less responsibility, too much dependence on government, too many children born to single mothers who get no support from the father, television on 24 hours a day with crappy programming, etc) you can still make your life enjoyable and productive. Given the subject, I was expecting a bleak read, but Mr. Clarey presented a practical treatise on a topic many become Chicken Little-esque is discussing. The text doesn't read as a prepper's guide nor the Unabomber's Manifesto. It was written in a thoughtful and practical manner. The premise is: If one cannot change the system to which he is bound, then one should take advantage to ensure, as best possible, a favorable outcome for himself and his loved ones.

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
