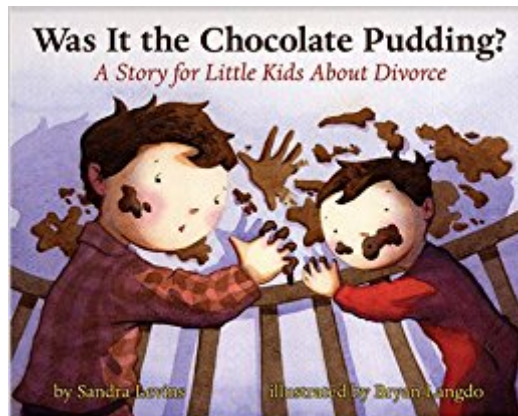

Bryan is the illustrator of over thirty books. His picture book "Tornado Slim and the Magic Cowboy Hat" won a 2012 Spur Award for Storytelling from Western Writers of America. Excellent story for helping little kids (which mine were) examine their instinctive question: "Was it my fault my parents got divorced?" It uses a minor home disaster caused by two little boys to illustrate what was probably just a "last straw" in their parents' marriage, and it helps them understand that the kids' own perceptions are only a tiny fraction of what happens between two divorcing parents.

My sons were 2 and 5 when I moved out, and it seemed perfect for that age. Probably also good up to age 7-8.

I wish I had read more reviews before I purchased this book. It was disturbing that the mother had limited visibility in this story, rather than the shared custody arrangement the book is meant to portray. I think this could be confusing to young children.

Great book that helps children to understand it is nothing they did that caused the parents to separate. Also provides definition for some adult words, such as 'divorce' (although I substitute the word 'divorce' in the book for 'separate' as there wasn't a marriage).

As a therapist who works with a lot of families dealing with divorce, I have found this book to be one of the best in explaining divorce-related issues to children in simple but helpful language. It deals quite well with issues related to parents arguing, and also with the self-blame children often feel after a divorce.

When my ex and I were going through a divorce I tried looking through many books to help our kids cope. I found almost all of them to be heavily biased towards either the mother or the father, portraying one as dysfunctional or unavailable. Since my kids had both a mother and a father who cared about them, I wanted to avoid causing more emotional damage to them by giving them a book which might make them worry that one or the other of us was going to abandon them or start drinking heavily. This book is designed to help kids understand that divorce is not their fault, that they didn't cause it and can't prevent it. It helps them to understand that the situation is not ideal, but that it will work out. I think it helps them to feel more "normal." And it doesn't portray one side as being substantially better parent than the other. It does have the kids spending more time during the week with the father than the mother. But the time that the kids are with their mother they are happy to be there and doing fun activities, and she offers them important parental advice. I really don't believe that there is a bias one way or the other in this book. Did the kids enjoy it? Now that our kids have pretty well adjusted to the divorce, two years later they still ask to have it read to them from time to time. I highly recommend this book along with Claire Masurel's "Two Homes" for any parents who desire above all to help their children cope with the anxiety of a divorce.
