

This book is now rather outdated, and has been surpassed by Kathryn LaBouff's "Singing and Communicating in English." It contains many elements of diction which have fallen out of style, or have been refined further through more specific use of the International Phonetic Alphabet. It does have its role in modern instruction of English lyric diction, but it is more as a reference, to be looked at after consulting other sources on the subject.

Even though this was written some years ago, it is an invaluable source for teaching ALL singers the proper sounds for words in English WHEN SINGING. I used this book many years ago myself and since have shared it with other singers. I sang professionally for years. When I first started out, one of my accompanists gave me this book and it's been my "bible" ever since. This should be mandatory for all students of voice, professional singers, choir/choral directors, choir/choral members. Madeline Marshall has definitely given all singers an invaluable assist with this book!! I recommend it highly!!!!!!

When my wife bought her copy of this book some years ago, it was about \$4.95 in paperback--your price increase is astounding!! For a book that should be in every choral director's and singer's library, such a price difference is uncalled-for, as there seem to be little difference in the contents.
