

There is still very little known about the life of Vivian Maier. What is known is that she was born in New York in 1926 and worked as a nanny for a family on Chicago's North Shore during the 50s and 60s. Seemingly without a family of her own, the children she cared for eventually acted as caregivers for Maier herself in the autumn of her life. She took hundreds of thousands of photographs in her lifetime, but never shared them with anyone. Maier lost possession of her art when her storage locker was sold off for non-payment. She passed away in 2009 at the age of 83. John Maloof is a filmaker and street photographer. He discovered the first negatives of Vivian Maier's work in 2007 while compiling a book about the history of the neighborhood where he grew up. He edited the first published collection of Maier's work, Vivian Maier: Street Photographer (powerHouse Books, 2011).Elizabeth Avedon is an independent curator and writer. The former Director of Photo-Eye Gallery, Santa Fe and Creative Director for The Gere Foundation, she has received awards and recognition for her exhibition design and publishing projects, including the retrospective exhibition and book: Avedon: 1949â "1979 at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Dallas Museum of Fine Arts; and Richard Avedon: In the American West for the Amon Carter Museum, the Corcoran Gallery of Art, and The Art Institute of Chicago, among many others. Vivian Maier: Self-PortraitsThis sublime book is a tour de force. The color and black-and-white photographs, most of which haven't been seen before, are wonderful. No surprise there. It is an even greater pleasure to view them because the book is so beautifully printed and designed!! This is my favorite book of Vivian Maier photos. Given Vivian's story seeing her use herself in so many self portraits has so much more meaning. And when you see the many different ways she incorporates herself into the environment to come up with all the different varieties of self portraits it's pretty amazing. I also like that there are a mixture of color and black and white photographs. The book itself is a quality hardcover with sharp, clear reproductions. If there's one complaint it's that the book designer used way too much white space around all of the photos. They should have been much bigger on the page since there is so much detail in some of the photos. Recommended.

Her self portraits are fascinating. Catching images in mirrors has always been done by People from past eras that didn't have easy methods for self image photography. It is meaningful, but interactive. Now, selfies are easily done, but I remember how difficult it used to be. Vivian Maier is a wonder and these self-portraits are uniformly sensational. I originally got the book from the library but was so impressed I decided to buy a copy. The book itself is beautifully printed and well-composed, but the work... amazing!

If you are interested in self portraits, this is a book to consider. Vivian Maier used unusual situations and locations to photograph herself. I bought the book and I would buy it again. But . . . I bought my book in Kindle and I think a hardbound book would have been a better choice. Kindle is great for

novels but photography books and cookbooks do not really work in Kindle because you cannot move back and forth easily between photographs or recipes.

It's an Ok book. I bought both self portraits and street photographer by John Maloof. There are some repetitive images but Street Photographer showcases much more diverse Vivian's works. Self-Portraits 's layout may need a better arrangement. I like images have white background frame however they are kind small. Several pages left completely white blank pages, a bit disappointed. Overall is an ok book not the best. If you want to purchase between both I recommend street photographer.

Vivian Maier's self-portraits are full of wit and cleverness. They are portraits of an intense and playful mind as much as of physical beings or objects. And when you add the fact that Maier's talent was only "discovered" after her death, the photographs make for even more affecting images.

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
